RALEIGH, N.C., (December 10, 2009) — The Allstate Foundation presented \$30,000 to Students Against Violence Everywhere (SAVE) to support SAVE chapters in Indiana in their efforts to increase youth safety and promote teen safe driving. This grant from the Allstate Foundation will support the SAVE program in five schools or community agencies and support teen safe driving awareness campaigns during key times of the year, such as holidays, prom, graduation and back-to-school.

SAVE is a peer-to-peer organization that strives to increase youth involvement in their own safety efforts. SAVE believes in the power of positive peer influences. According to a recent Allstate Foundation report on teen safe driving, peers are a major influence on teens – both positive and negative. Nearly half said they are sometimes distracted by passengers (47 percent), and nearly as many said they drive more safely without friends in the car (44 percent). More than half (53 percent) said friends would be the most effective influence in getting them to drive more safely.¹

SAFETY TIPS FROM TEENS FOR TEENS

Teen Safety While Driving

- **Avoid distractions.** Talking or texting on your cell phone while driving gives you the reaction time of a 70-year old. Texting a friend, eating a cheeseburger and listening to loud music increases your chance of crashing.
- **Be defensive.** Leave room between you and the cars around you.
- **Wear your seat belt.** Research has shown that wearing lap/shoulder belts can reduce the risk of dying in a crash by 45 percent.
- **Remember that driving anytime can be dangerous.** Even driving home from school can be deadly! Teens are most at risk between 3 p.m. and midnight.
- **Slow down!** You're not invincible.
- **Speak up if your friend is driving like a maniac or wants you to!** Don't let your silence be the last thing either of you hears.
- **Realize that a crash really can happen to you.** Make good choices when you are behind the wheel. They may just save your life. Or your friend's life.

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Teen Safety in Your School & Community

- **Get involved!** Get involved in making your school and community safer – Join or start a SAVE Chapter!
- **Pass it on!** Educate your peers about different ways to stop violence and to be safe.
- **Respect others.** Be accepting and appreciating of other people of different cultures, races, ethnicities and backgrounds.
- **Steer clear.** Avoid trouble areas in your school and community.
- **Say no!** Don't use alcohol or drugs and stay away from students associated with them.
- **Educate yourself!** Be educated on the topic of violence prevention and teen safety.
- **Settle arguments with words, not fists or weapons.** Talk about issues instead of expressing anger through fights.
- **Be a friend.** Step outside of your current circle of friends and be a good friend to everyone. Befriend someone who is being bullied.
- **Stand up!** Do the right thing - even when it is the most difficult thing to do!

"Kids today have to spread the news about how to drive smarter and The Allstate Foundation's support will help to provide our SAVE chapter with the tools needed to do that," said Coreen Johnson, a student at Elmhurst High School in Fort Wayne (IN) and President of her school's SAVE chapter.
