Did YOU Know?

Male teens are 1 1/2 more times likely to die in motor vehicle crashes than female teens!

Motor vehicle crashes are the #1 killer of teens in the US.

Nearly 6,000 teenagers are killed in motor vehicle crashes each year. That's an average of 16 teens every day!

Among teens involved in fatal crashes, 31% of the drivers who were killed had been drinking.

What YOU Can Do!

Host discussion sessions

Make awareness posters

Create a paper chain of life with every student's name on a link and challenge students to not break the chain

Organize a mock crash with local rescue and law enforcement

Organize an assembly with guest speakers who have felt the impact of teen drivers

Chalk it on the sidewalk

Create dashboard stickers or cell phone charm reminders



Conduct a pledge drive

Host a tailgate party before the football game to raise awareness
